8. In Texas there has been way too many shootings. Studies show that in the time span of 8 months we
9. have had 12 mass shootings with 25 deaths. Even though we don't have the most shootings we have
10. the most deaths. Those numbers don't even include all the little shootings. In all we have a total of
11. 45767 shootings. Police are pulling guns and shooting people without even knowing for sure that they
12. don't have a gun. This needs to stop. All of these unnecessary acts are causing our state and county to
13. go into havoc. It's all over the news, instead of talking about this issue we need to solve it.

16. In Texas to get a licence to carry a handgun you need a valid driver's licence, current demographic, 17. address, contact, and employment information, information regarding any psychiatric, drug, alcohol, or 18. criminal history (new users only), a valid email address and a valid credit card. If you want to renew 19. your licence you need to do it in a timespan of 6 months after expiration. If you try to renew your 20. license after six months you must pay a late fee and buy a new licence. This is our law and it needs to 21. have some minor adjustments. First we need to make it where anytime you get your licence renewed or 22. you get a licence you must get a background check. When you get a licence you should have to take a test about handling and carrying a gun. Then you must sign a contract saying that you will follow all the 23. 24. laws and precautions because if you don't then your gun will be revoked permanently. This will ensure that everyone knows the laws and will not break them. Security in gun stores need to be raised. There 25. needs to be guards and shatter proof glass around all the guns. Multiple security cameras would be 26. helpful too. You also will need a special certification stating that you are allowed to guard and own a 27. gun store. You may not buy guns for other people. You can go with them to buy it, but it must be under 28. their name unless under the age of 18. If you are a police officer then you must go under specific 29. training on how to deal with problems when the person is under watch of weapon. Then you can get a 30. gun. Every year you must take the same test and reearn your permit. If you fail to do so then your gun 31. will be taken away until further notice when you can retake the lesson. This is to ensure that all police 32. officers know what they are doing. In schools we need to teach kids to not mess around with guns and 33. teach them the dangers that can be produced with these weapons. For the people coming into Texas 34. they have to undergo a background check, noting that they haven't done any serious crimes. If there 35. are any marks on their background check from serious crimes then they won't be able to enter Texas 36. with any weapons. 37.

5. All 208 college campuses in Texas

6. Justification:

7. Through the past year, one topic that has occurred as a major controversy is campus carry. 8. Although college shootings are very rare they are possible. Many people would argue that campus 8. carry is strictly allowing students to provide themselves with self-defense. During a gunfight a 9. uniformed officer arrives at the scene, how will the police officer identify the shooter from a civilian if they both are obtaining guns. The odds of having a student with a stable mind and 10. sufficient reaction time are very low. According to Usa today, Jared Loughner who was was not 11. mentally sane, killed 7 people at Arizona University. He was tackled by unarmed students and 12. they took his weapon away, the man with the conceledgun almost shot one of the samaritans. In 13. an article by time.com, of all the shootings in the United States during 2015, only three occurred

- 14. in Texas. Fifty years ago at UT-Austin, occurred the tower shooting of 1966. 49 people were shot
- 15. and 14 were killed by a 25 year old man veteran and student. Survivors of the mass shooting
- 16. testified that guns only made the situation worse by provoking the veteran into shooting more,
- 17. causing more casualties. Campus administration, teachers, faculty and students also testified that 18. the best way to ensure campus safety was to compatible to prohibit guns.
- 19. "Today marks the 50th Anniversary of the library tower shooting at the University of Texas at
- 20. Austin, where one man, a 25 year-old military veteran and student climbed the library tower on
- campus with rifles, handguns, and shotguns, and shot 49 people killing 14 (earlier in the day he
- also killed two family members). It is uncertain exactly why he committed this heinous act, but 50
- years later, we still face the threat of mass shootings a threat exacerbated by a new law parmitting concepted carry of bandquins on compute (SR 11) "
- permitting concealed carry of handguns on campus (SB 11)."

- 25. In the United States, over 1,000 suicides occur on college campuses, and one in every ten
- 26. students plan suicides. Although poisoning and overdose are the most common attempts of
- 27. suicides, the result in a fatality is only 2 percent. As for firearm suicide, the result in a fatality is
- 28. 85 percent of the attempts. Professionals also agree that firearms have increased suicides on campuses.
- 30. "We know that college students are in this zone between adolescence and adulthood, with greatly
- increased risk factors for suicide including binge drinking and depression," ~Jeffrey Swanson, medical sociologist at Duke University.

- Our proposal for action is to only allow all faculty (administrators, teachers, and campus security)
 to carry on campus. There are many ways to prevent deaths in colleges, however we will only list
 three. First you have to identify mentally ill students, give them treatment, discourage them from
 buying guns, and having campus security always at the ready.

Because the pregnant women and fathers may need that money before the baby is born to pay for the nursery and diapers etc. Babies 11. 12. also cost! This needs to be covered by all businesses that are covered by the 13. FMLA(family and medical leave act) and ones who are not. Then they must be eligible to 14. take at least 12 weeks to take off parental leave to have time with the new baby. 15. There are three requirements to be eligible for the employee. **Number one** You must 16. have worked for your employer for at least 12 months as of the date when your leave

- 17. will start. These months need not be consecutive, but the employer doesn't have to
- 18. count any time your worked before a break in service of seven years or more.
- 19. Did you know that the FMLA also covers family or personal illness, family military leave,
- pregnancy, adoption, or the foster care placement of a child.**Number two**, must have 20.
- 21. worked at least 1,250 hours (about 24 hours per week) for your employer in the 12
- 22. months immediately preceding the start of your leave. Number three you must work at
- 23. a worksite with at least 50 employees within a 75-mile radius. If you are part of a small
- 24. group of employees that works at a remote satellite office, for example, you might not
- 25. be eligible to use the FMLA, even if your company employs thousands nationwide.

28. **Proposal for Action:**Our ideas to change this start with helping businesses become 29. eligible for the FMLA by assisting them with these requirements, An employer must comply with the FMLA if it has at least 50 employees for at least 20 weeks of the current 30. 31. calendar year or the immediately preceding calendar year. The 20 weeks need not be 32. consecutive.

- 33. Independent contractors don't count toward the total, but all part-time and full-time 34. employees count, as do employees who are on leave and expected to return to

- 6.4% of all workers in Texas being paid by the hour are paid the minimum wage, that's
- 9. 400,000 people. This does not include the families and people who depend on the person or people who have those jobs. According to
- 11. <u>http://www.worldatlas.com/articles/us-poverty-rate-by-state.htm</u>l, the percentage of
- Texas' population under the poverty line is 16.4%. If we do the math here, considering
- that the population of Texas in 2016 is 27.6 million people, according to
- 15. <u>http://population2016.com/population-of-texas-in-2016.html</u>, then about 1.8 million
- 16. people in Texas are in poverty. Poverty is not something to be taken lightly anywhere,
- 17. and especially in Texas. According to https://talkpoverty.org/state-year-report/texas-
- 18. <u>2014-report/</u>, 12% of high schoolers were not able to graduate after 4 years of high
- 19. school in 2012, 17% of youth ages 18-24 were not in school or working in 2013, 18% of
- 20. households were food insecure from 2012-2013, and 81% of unemployed workers did
- 21. not have insurance to aid them in 2013. All of these things were almost completely due
- 22. to an insufficient amount of money and education, in other words, poverty.

- 25. The minimum wage in Texas should be raised to \$10 an hour, because the minimum 26. wage in Texas is currently \$7.25, which has shown to be one of the main causes of 27. poverty in Texas. According to http://www.worldatlas.com/articles/us-poverty-rate-by-28. state.html, this proposal will most likely get a lot of votes due to the fact that most of 29. the workers in Texas are in fact being paid the minimum wage. On top of that, as we 30. mentioned in our justification, Texas has a poverty rate of 16.4%. 8. Texas is infamously known for its lack in educational depth. Texas is currently ranked

- 8. 47th in SAT scores in the nation. Additionally, we are also ranked 43rd in national
- 9. education. This is not the education the students should receive. Changes will be made
- 10. to the curriculum so that students cover more material. We will also omit exceedingly
- 11. repetitive curriculum since it is unnecessary. The curriculum will be restructured so that
- 12. topics currently covered in later grades will be covered earlier. Earlier grades,
- 13. particularly elementary years, do not have much curriculum to cover. However, as the
- 14. years progress, the curriculum begins to become more packed. Moving curriculum to the
- 15. early years will allow students in later grades to not only be able to learn more, but

How would you feel if the government promised to give every citizen the same amount of money, 9. but you discover that you were getting less because you were a little different from everyone 10. else? The government is not really giving away money, but it is very similar to what the State of 11. Texas has done to special education students. All students have a right to receive a quality 12. education. However, special education students are not being serviced properly by the school 13. system in Texas. Special Education services are provided to students with various conditions that 14. include autism, ADHD, dyslexia, traumatic brain injuries, epilepsy, mental illnesses, speech 15. impairments, blindness, deafness, and learning disabilities. In Texas, 8.5% of students are 16. classified as needing special education. That is much lower than the 12.9% nationally, and it is a 17. 12% drop from the number of Texas students in special education 12 years ago. One of the main problems is that the State of Texas has denied thousands of children access to special education 18. by placing restrictions on the number of students who can receive this service. Although the 19. Texas Education Agency denies the 8.5% goal, many teachers and school districts state that 20. noncompliance would lead to audits and a requirement for corrective action plans designed to 21. lower the number of kids in special education. Besides the state percentage limit, there are other 22. reasons special needs students are not receiving the education they deserve. First, many parents 23. are not involved in their children's education, or they do not have the knowledge to make sure 24. that their child is receiving what they need. Another issue is that many teachers, especially 25. general education teachers, do not receive the necessary training to properly teach students with 26. special needs who are placed in their classrooms. 27.

28. **Proposal for Action:**

29. To begin to solve these issues, the federal government needs to get involved by having the U.S. 30. Department of Education look into the issue of a limit being placed on special education services 31. and referrals in Texas. They need to look at the way the program is operated and how funds are 32. being used. Next, parents need to become more involved in their child's education. Research 33. shows that children are more likely to succeed in school if their families are involved in their 34. education. Parents need to learn more about their child's needs, and they need to make sure that 35. the schools are meeting those needs. Schools need to create programs to build a bridge between 36. school and home. Programs should also be developed to educate parents about their rights. Finally, if the goal is to place special needs students in the general education classroom with all 37. other students for most of the day, teacher certification programs need to provide more training 38. for teachers in dealing with the various types of special needs students that they may teach. 39. Many teachers have stated that very little of their training focused on special education programs 40. or resources.

Students pay anywhere from 11. \$700 and up. Major SAT prep companies include Kaplan, Princeton Review, Power Score, Revolution Prep, Set for College, Test Masters, and Top Test Prep. SAT scores increase is by 300 points with SAT 12. prep in the state of Texas. The SAT and the PSAT are very closely related and the amount of students 13. taking the tests increases each year. According to the College Board" A larger, more diverse group of 14. students took the SATs and PSATs than ever before during 2014-2015. In the fall of 2014, 3.8 million 15. students took the PSAT — the practice version of the SATs — compared to 3.7 million in 2013 and 3.6 16. million in 2010. Similarly, a record 1.7 million students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, while 1.67 17. million did the same from the class of 2014 and 1.65 million from the class of 2011. However, if a student is an ineffective tester or has a learning 13. difference, the school is unfairly held accountable for circumstances beyond their 14. control. The weighty responsibility of testing outcomes has encouraged many teachers 15. to abandon their class curricula in favor of teaching to the test. 16.

17. Proposal for Action:

Instead of proctoring STAAR exams at individual schools, we propose that the State of 18. Texas adopt testing centers for each school district to administer the test. By doing so, 19. we would remove STAAR execution responsibilities from teachers and schools allowing 20. for a more accurate depiction of student performance. A "boil-water" advisory is a notification to the people in the 14. affected area to boil their water before consuming it. The number of "boil-water 15. advisories has nearly tripled from only 650 in 2008 to 1,550 in 2015. While 16. many harmful objects are already not accepted for normal disposal, there are 17. still some items that are allowed that could pollute water sources, such as 18. 19. cleaners and chemicals.

22. There are multiple ways to make sure that chemical waste does not pollute 23. water sources. Hazardous waste and chemicals need to be disposed properly to 24. 25. lessen the rate of "boil-water" advisories. A solution to this is to make sure that 26. all possibly harmful chemicals are separated, contained, and treated. Having 27. designated areas to dispose of chemicals keeps contaminants out of lakes and 28. rivers. Another way to reduce "boil-water" advisories is to improve and 29. modernize water treatment facilities. Moreover, food factories and chemical 30. 31. plant farms could also cut down the amount of chemicals used and make sure 32. that none of the chemicals pollute the water. In addition, the farmers can plant 33. trees at the edges of their fields so any rain that might contain chemicals can be 34. stopped before they enter a water source. 35.

Appleseed reports that more than 80 percent of prisoners in Texas are high school dropouts. Not 16. to mention that dropping out can have generational impacts in families. Kids whose parents have 17.

- dropped out tend to fall in similar patterns as their parents. 18.

I propose that we establish block schedules in public high schools to raise high school graduation 21. rates. We are suggesting the A/B block scheduling method, which is where students take four 22. atlternating classes per day with their class periods being twice as long as the schools traditional 23. class period length. This means that the students would have less of a variety of homework each 24. day and less types of information to deal with, both of which will reduce stress levels, which are 25. one of the main causes of dropouts. Teachers would also have more time available to work with 26. students individually, causing better student/teacher relationships. A paper by Brown University states that with block scheduling, students' grades improve, a higher number of students achieve 27. honor roll, GPAs improve, and fewer students fail classes. Additional research from Brown 28. University says that the transfer to block scheduling does not have to increase school 29. funding/spending. And because there are less passing periods, there is less time for kids to be 30. chaotic in the halls (this means less fights and/or bullying), and research from the Challenge 31. Discovery Projects Organization says that 1 in 10 students drop out of school because of repeated 32. bullying.

As you can see, block scheduling corrects many issues in high schools that cause students to drop out, such as decreasing stress levels, allowing students to have more one on one time with 37. teachers, and just overall improving classroom communities. All these factors should help 38. decrease the high school dropout rates. With more high school graduates, Texas will begin to 39. become a more educated and responsible place to live in.

This may not seem 20. necessary, but many opioid users don't anything about opioid other than that is helps 21. reduce pain. Another essential part of the solution is to create a system where 22. pharmacies can track how many opioids a person receives daily. Most people don't 23. people don't get their drugs of the streets or from family and friends; they get them 24. from legally written prescriptions. But many individuals go from hospital to hospital 25. asking multiple doctors to give them opiates. If pharmacies have a way to track how 26. many opioids someone has bought in the past few days, they can prevent the majority of 27. these deaths. The final step of this process is to attach a dose of naloxone to the opiates 28. themselves. Naloxone is a drug that is non-addictive and helps reverse the side effects of 29. opioid temporarily. This is actually an idea that many sites and companies have thought 30. of executing.


